Notes from a Manger

"And Jesus grew in wisdom and stature, and in favor with God and man."

- Luke 2: 52 - NIV


The manger is empty. Mary, Joseph and the rest of the cast have left the building. They have taken the "baby Jesus" with them. The audience is gone. They, too, have left the Sunday morning worship service. They, also, have taken a bit of Jesus with them. It is the morning after the Christmas program.

Ask people you know. The Birth of Jesus (The Christmas Story) is the most familiar Bible story most of us know. We first learned about it in Sunday School or, perhaps, our parents shared the story with us as a small child. As children, some of us became Mary, Joseph, shepherds, angels, wisemen, ... We acted out the story on stage in front of a supportive audience. Some of us have even turned to Luke, chapter 2, and read the story for ourselves. It seems that more people are familiar with the account of Jesus' birth than, perhaps, any other Bible story – even the accounts of Creation and the Resurrection.

Is this really a surprise? More people know about the birth account because Christmas is the most likely time they will be in church to hear a Bible story. Polls have indicated that, on any average Sunday, only about one of every six (17%) of Americans, who call themselves "Christians," will actually attend a church service. In a nation founded on Biblical principals we have lost most of the discipline of our founders. We have more instant access to worldly and temporal information than our founding parents could have ever dreamed of. We know far less about eternal things that would make longterm differences in our lives.

A friend of mine once observed that Christianity, at its core, is very basic. If someone were taught nothing

more than John 3:16 – and believed and took action on it – that alone would be sufficient for salvation. So, why learn more than that. First, it is our curious human nature that would lead us to learn more. Secondly, knowing only one story very well is like opening up a book – anywhere, reading a few pages and then noting that we have, in fact, read the book. Yet, in the words of the late Paul Harvey, do we really know "the rest of the story?"

Jesus grew up. The gospel of Luke continues immediately from the birth of Jesus to his presentation in the temple at eight days of age. Then there is a gap of almost 12 years and we learn nothing about his childhood. At age 12, we read the account of Jesus in the temple; after which there is a longer gap until his baptism by John the Baptist and the beginning of three years of ministry. Jesus gathered together his 12 disciples and taught them, using parables, about his mission on Earth. That mission? Know John 3:16. The parables? Come to church and learn. Read the gospel accounts. The religious authorities did not understand Christ's true mission. The government rulers were "threatened" by it. False accusations of blasphemy and treason abounded. Like a common criminal, they crucified our savior. Nailed to a cross, on a dark Friday afternoon, Jesus died a painful death for our sins. Story over.

Wrong! On Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene – and others (Luke 24) – took spices to the tomb to prepare Jesus' body. The rock in front of the doorway was rolled away. Even as the manger could not hold Jesus, neither could an earthly tomb. The tomb is empty. Jesus is alive!

Eleven of the disciples would live on to spread Jesus' message. They would carry it out to the known world. Now it is our turn. Let us resolve, in this new year, to awaken to our full potential as "Christians." Read the gospels. Take action. Come to church on Sunday and learn "the rest of the story." Share your joy with others. Like the early disciples, and our Christmas play cast, carry "Jesus" with you.




