Notes from Half-way

"You will show me the path of life; in Your presence is fullness of joy; at Your right hand are pleasures forevermore."

Psalms 16:11 - NKJV

Today, Highway 11 wends its way across southern Wisconsin, beginning at Racine's lakefront and ending where it links with U.S. 151. A short drive will then take you across the Mississippi River and into Dubuque. Imagine that you are traveling this route in the 1800s. You are following a popular stage-coach route. One resting place on your journey will be the "Half-way Tree" (pictured above). Much smaller when you first saw it, this bur oak is located at the half-way point of your journey. You will find an inn for travelers in nearby Brodhead.

Driving this route some time ago, I was reminded that we, as Christians, are also on a journey. Our journey takes us through life. Where are you on your Christian journey?

When you start out on a trip it is smart to prepare for the road ahead. You will want to stop and get gas ahead of time. Also, check the oil, battery, belts, tires, shocks and brakes. Upgrade as necessary. You will also want to pack those things you will need for the trip. If the route is uncertain, have a good map or reliable GPS handy.

Before we can even start our Christian journey, we must first be convicted by the Holy Spirit that, like everyone else (see Romans 3:23) we are a sinner in need of a savior. God's salvation is the "gas" for our journey. With no gas, you're stuck in "Racine."* Jesus is our GPS, map and moral compass, ready to guide us along the correct highway. We have a direct link to God's GPS through prayer.

Now, just as there are many roads that lead out of Racine, there are many other religions. There are other paths with interesting places we could travel to. But, if you want to go to Dubuque,* only one road will ultimately get you there. Caution:

From the Pastor



tick... tick... tick... tick... tick... tick...

It's a soft sound that I have heard emanating from behind my desk chair in nearly every office I have occupied since about 1997. At times the sound can be a torment to me, but I have been in the habit of gracing my work-

space with a certain clock, the source of this noise.

I received the clock as an award of sorts, although I wouldn't say it was an honor to possess it. The pewter clock face is engraved with a lighthouse painted distinctively with a spiral design, probably representing the light at Cape Hatteras located on the Outer Banks in North Carolina. Also on the face of the clock is the proud inscription, "Chaplains, United States Coast Guard." Come by and see it, if you like. I won't charge admission!

Yes, receiving it was a dubious honor at best. The occasion was a gathering of Navy Chaplains serving Coast Guard units, who were meeting for their annual continuing education. The Senior Chaplain of the Coast Guard had lined up volunteer speakers to present useful information to benefit our ministry to our units. At the end of each presentation, he would shake hands with the speaker and present each speaker with this nice pewter clock as a token of gratitude.

After a few such presentations, I began to think of ways to poke fun at the gift giving and, in the spirit of being playful, I would remark how nice it would be if we all might have such a tribute. Making that remark once or twice might have been all right, but I went just a bit too far with the teasing. The Senior Coast Guard Chaplain stopped presenting the gift before the gathering and gave them out quietly as the presenter left the room. He had worked very hard to cultivate a spirit of dignity, but my wisecracking, and the cracks of another chaplain of similar bent, had made the gesture a laughingstock. Humor is a wonderful thing in moderation, bringing charm and cheer to all who are gathered, but my wisecracking colleague and I had gone way too far.

At the end of the event, the Senior Chaplain gave closing remarks and then awarded my colleague and me each with the blessed clock! It was the perfect response to my overzealous joking around. I remember being devastated by the gift, and rightly so! I now place it near my desk to remind me of how un-charming my charm can be! I hope some of those impulses to play the comedian have mellowed over time. I hope the I have a clearer understanding of what constitutes an overdose of humor. The clock is a reminder of how easy it is for me to cross the line!

There are some routes that will actually follow Highway 11 for a while and seem correct. They will ultimately turn off and lead you astray. Don't get lost in "Beloit."*

Just as we want to get our car in good working order, we need to prepare for our Christian journey with the study of God's word. That will provide the "oil" to make everything "flow" smoothly during our journey. Check and upgrade frequently! Also, have good shocks (sense of humor) because the road of life can get bumpy; and good brakes (Christian ethics) because, like a deer in the headlights, Satan will throw roadblocks in your way.

Just as there is one Highway 11, but many kinds of vehicles we may drive, there is only one path, but many ways to travel our Christian journey. A few will choose to "drive" solo, following a "monastic" way of life. They may even find value in such a life if they are called by God to a special task. Their ancestors, in the Middle Ages, spent years in the necessary Bible translating work. Monks aside, it is best when we share the journey with others. Joining a church before setting out is like becoming a part of God's "van pool." Your personal growth is faster and more enjoyable when you journey together, sharing mutual experiences. Maturity in your Christian life journey is produced through relationships and community.

Just as God made different kinds of people, there are different ways to "drive" your Christian journey. Some will choose the "businessman's" way of travel. Drive straight through and get to Dubuque in about four hours. They find salvation — and then join a church, but never really attend or share in its ministry — and still cross the river into paradise. BUT, LIFE IS TOO SHORT! "Stop and smell the roses." Along the way, take a moment to enjoy the scenery, visit a tourist attraction, get on a church committee, teach Sunday School, do satisfying mission work, attend a church dinner, ... or even stop at the "Half-way Tree" and relax for a while. One day, before you know it, you'll cross over the river. On to Dubuque!*


